



Dr. Richard Arnold Cording

June 23, 1936 - July 5, 2021

Dr. Richard "Dick" Arnold Cording, 85, passed away on July 5, 2021, in Huntsville, Texas. He passed peacefully at home, with his wife by his side.

He was preceded in death by his parents, Melvin Gerhardt Cording and Helen Rhudy Cording, his sister Patricia Cording Pearce and his daughter Susan Dwan Cording Smith. He is survived by his wife of 64 years, Frances Watson Cording, daughters Lisa Lynne Cording Burns and husband Rick, Sheri Renae Cording Gaines and husband John, Jennifer Shay Cording Cox and husband Nelson, son in law Timothy Smith, grandchildren Richard Cording Burns and wife Mallory, Colby Watson Burns, Savannah Shay Gaines, Sarah Frances Gaines Brown and husband Jackson, Stratton Cording Gaines, Nelson E "Trey" Cox III, Tristynn Ansley Cox, Braedon James Smith, great-grandchildren Jadyn Lee Goodrow, Bret Maverick Burns, his brother Terry Melvin Cording and wife Delois, as well as a circle of extended family and close friends.

Dick grew up in Wallace, North Carolina, where he and Frances were childhood friends and later high school sweethearts. Dick graduated from Wallace High School in 1954 and was voted Most Likely to Succeed and Best All-Around. He and Frances married the summer after her first and his second year of college. He graduated with his B.A. from The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. He furthered his education by obtaining a M.A. and Ph.D. from the University of Missouri.

Dr. Cording's 40-year career with Sam Houston State University began in 1970 when he was recruited to initiate and develop the Philosophy Department. From 1981 to 1994, Dr. Cording was dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, presiding over a period of dynamic growth and development. He founded and was the first president of the Texas Deans of Liberal Arts and Sciences during this time. In 2013, he was a recipient of the Sam Houston State University Wall of Honor.

Dr. Cording then returned to his great love as professor of philosophy, professor emeritus of philosophy, and served as an adviser to his beloved students in the Student Advising and Mentoring Center.

As a professor, Cording exhibited top-notch teaching skills, maintaining superior student-evaluation scores some 35 years after winning the university's Excellence in Teaching Award. His 44-year record of teaching is a testament to his dedication to his students.

Dick and Frances have been faithful members of First United Methodist Church for 51 years. Dick was a member of many committees and served on the administrative board. Dick was also active in civic affairs. He served as President of the Rotary Club and was a recipient of The Paul Harris Fellow Award.

Dick was best known for his love of family, golf, games of chance, religious study, self-exploration, and all sports. The only teams he rooted for more strongly than his beloved North Carolina Tar Heels were his kids' and grandkids' sports teams. Dick was a fierce competitor striving for the win, from the golf course to the poker table and family games while befriending and supporting his competition along the way. Dick was fondly called by many names: Dad, Sweetheart, Pop, Dean, Doc, Dickey-doo, Coach, and 321. He served many roles. He was often credited with rescuing students' college careers when challenged, turning a rocky academic career around for a struggling student.

Visitation will be Friday, July 9, 2021 at 10:00 AM and the service for Dr. Richard Cording will be held at 11:00 AM, both at First United Methodist Church of Huntsville. Burial to follow at Oakwood Cemetery-Mayes Addition, Huntsville, Texas.

“ Dick hired me in 1971 as the second person in the Philosophy Department, and in the very next year we hired Tom Satre. Dick was the leader of our trio, and he led by his inspiration and his example which was that, if you take care to do the best you can for your students and to respect your faculty colleagues, then good things will follow. Dick also encouraged us to innovate in our courses, so we quite early on began to teach courses in Critical Thinking and Contemporary Moral issues, for example. It helped immensely that Dick was so well-regarded by faculty across the university and had, by his teaching, created a group of students who were enthusiastic about learning philosophy.

Janet and I also got to know Frances and the girls, and in fact for a while we lived next door to them on Avenue O. That made it easier for one of the girls to be our first baby-sitter for our two very young children. Dick was always a person who lovingly put his family first, and it showed over the years to all of us who knew him.

Dick was a student of a philosophical movement known as Existentialism, and he taught a course on it for many years. He was especially familiar with the work of Jean-Paul Sartre, and I appreciate a bit of irony in that. One of Sartre's characters in the play No Exit utters the line "Hell is other people." This is exactly the opposite of the way Dick saw other people. As an example,, to my mind it was very fitting that in his retirement Dick worked part time at the SHSU Student Advising and Mentoring Center. There he helped students to stay on track and to finish their degrees. It was work that showed us all how deep and continuing his commitment was to taking good care of the students who place themselves in our hands.

“ Dr. Cording was a gentle giant of a father, and his 70-year love affair with his wife, Frances, was a fairy tale romance come true.

As a three-year-old, new to Huntsville, I was lucky enough to move in a few doors down from the Cordings on Elmwood. I immediately gained four sisters. I also gained Dr. Cording as another role model for the powerful influence that strong, smart, patient men can have on their daughters (and their daughters' friends). He was so endearing in his interactions with his daughters, for whom he had affectionate, silly nicknames. He was calm in the presence of the chaos of four daughters and always supported their talents from twirling to band to cheerleading to dance to softball. And, he was equally supportive of their friends.

My two favorite memories are these:

Dr. Cording has an old, blue VW Bug that he loved. Showing sign of age, the floorboards were failing and you could see through to the pavement passing quickly below. We loved playing Fred Flintstone and Barney Rubble in that car by pretending that we were propelling it with our feet.

And, the visual that will live with me for the rest of my life will be Dr. Cording and my father, Bud Warren, sitting on the mounds adjacent to the fields on the SHSU campus in the scorching Texas summer heat wearing golf shirts and short (and perhaps discretely hiding their cigarettes from view) while Jennifer and I performed at cheerleading camp. They were committed and present and selfless dads, and we all are so much stronger, kinder, and wiser for it.
