“ Dear family,

Uncle Austin was with me from birth and will be with me til the end. I deeply regret that i could not make it for his funeral. Without giving a long speech, i would just say this: for 46 years, Uncle Austin has been all these things to me, a cautionary tale, a hero of living life for the sake of living, an artist of humor and not taking ones self seriously, and most importantly an inspiration of how any person can rise above their humanity by sheer will power and become a positive example for the rest of us. I wish i could be there to share what he has meant to my life, so people could understand how one man can affect a whole family and beyond. In short, his transformation based on just sheer want to, from one type of person to another, is what i go to when i feel that i have not the willpower to face my greatest challenges. This to me is remarkable, and has been in my daily thoughts for a long, long time. There are few individuals whom i have ever known or even heard of with that kind of willpower, and i often relate that to my own children and strive to emulate his example, regardless of the issue. His lesson is that perserverence and fortitude can overcome common beliefs, peer pressure and every other kind of pressure if you believe hard enough. My children and probably most people of their generation cannot understand what i am talking about, because they don't know the details of his life, or what life was like in his decades of living in America. I will always feel that it is up to us in my generation, who do understand the difficulties associated with Uncle Austin's time to pass along those realities and values to our progeny. I am lucky that the last time i spent time with him was out in the field, hunting birds with the man who taught me how to actually hit the birds and not just shoot at them. We were sitting on the edge of the field and he actually missed a few before i realized that finally at his advanced age, he really could not see them anymore. This from a man that never missed a shot in my youth, and i told my own children to watch if they wanted to know how to hunt. I told him how much his story and what he did with his life really meant to me and how his transformation gave me the strength

to not only accomplish my own life's mission, but also to make sure that no matter my faults, that my children could have an example of overcoming life's difficulties, and a model of how to succeed. Of course, he demurred and self-deprecated in the face of such compliments, but i believe that in his heart, he understood and appreciated his very positive effects on my life. That is the way i will remember Uncle Austin, sitting on that five gallon bucket of his, pointing out the way the dove will fly according the weather of that particular day, but knowing in his heart that he represented the good part of life and he had a positive effect on the folks that really matter.
