



Raphael Antonio Reiner

March 17, 1927 - October 13, 2008

R.A. (Ray) Reiner died on October 13, 2008. He was born in New Jersey on March 17, 1927. During World War II, he volunteered to serve in the United States Army as an Infantry private. He performed active federal military service in the United States Army for over 25 years, retiring as a Lieutenant Colonel of Artillery in 1970. Following the earning of a doctorate at New Mexico State University in 1973, he was employed by the Office of Academic Affairs at Sam Houston State University. He retired from Sam Houston State University in 1995 as Associate Vice President for Academic Affairs, Emeritus. He desired that immediately following his death his body be cremated and that his remains be interred at the Federal Cemetery at Fort Bliss, Texas.
