“ Tribute to Steve Owens
Monday June 29th 2009

Good evening to everyone. My name is Ray Dixon and I was given the honor and privilege of speaking with you tonight about Steve.

When Marsa first asked me to do this I thought that this would be easy - to get up and talk about the man who I have known for 37 years and who I hold as my closest friend and really more like my brother. In trying to organize my thoughts for this, the challenge became apparent. How in the world can I define a man who was so unique, so complex, yet so uncomplicated? I think that the best I will be able to do is to share a few thoughts, insights and lessons I learned in my time with Steve. I hope that my ramblings will make sense. For those of us who grew up with Steve we knew him as “The O-Head” so if that term slips out in the course of our conversations you will know who we are talking about. O-Head – a definitely unique nickname for a definitely unique person. It went past being just a nickname, it was a persona, it was even an Icon. The other day Mark Stelly commented on the other prominent figures who, like Steve, passed from this earth on June 25th in saying “that two icons had passed today - Farah Fawcett and O-Head”. I wish we could hear what clever and hilarious comment that Steve would have for that because, if he was nothing else, he was the Master of observation and comment. And they were almost always hilarious. Steve’s enduring sense of humor is probably what we will all remember best. I know that if I had a nickel for every time he has made me laugh in the last 37 years, I would probably belong to the same country club as Bill Gates.

Steve’s sense of humor was so strong and pervasive and he didn’t let his illness take that from him. MAJOR LESSON IN LIFE HERE. I sat with him a couple of times while he was getting chemo treatments. My thought was to be there to “cheer him up” and help him pass the time. As usual, Steve had me rolling with laughter and we got in trouble with the nurses more than once for being a bit too rowdy for a healthcare setting.

What has become apparent to me over the years with Steve is what was behind that sense of humor. Steve’s Mom remarked the other day about how he could find humor in so many situations. I think that really came from both his incredible powers of observation, and a desire to really “see” things. Steve was always “looking” and very little ever escaped his attention. I know there were several times in my life that I wished he weren’t quite so observant. As many here will know, Steve really didn’t let you get away with much. The observation powers and the sense of humor made for adventure when you were around Steve. Something simple like driving to a convenience store to fill up the truck might turn out to be a memorable experience if Steve was with you. Come to think of it all road trips (long or short) with Steve were incredibly memorable - especially if you were in the Shark.

Steve always lived in the time he was in and lived fully. By that I mean he wasn’t putting conditions on his happiness like “I’ll be happy and life will start after I get

my degree, or this job, or this pay raise". That kind of stuff. I think he understood and practiced the notion that "Life is a Journey and Not a Destination" The biggest part of Living in His Time for the past almost 20 years for Steve was his marriage and family life. There was absolutely no question that Marsa, Clare, Meredith and most recently, David were the main focus in his life. I truly cannot think of a conversation I have had with Steve where we didn't discuss some aspect of family life even during the worst throes of his illness, He always seemed more concerned about the effect his illness was having on everyone else. Again MAJOR LIFE LESSON HERE!

Having said that that I think we know Steve had a good appreciation for the past. No surprise I guess that he chose History as his subject to teach. Steve could always lay a quote or historical tidbit on you and has been doing it since we were te
